## The Hunter Park Story

### *History of Friends of Hunter Park*

Eastside neighbors may have heard of the Friends of Hunter Park (FHP); however, people may not know how this group came to be. In February and April of 2004, Eastside residents came together to discuss a Master Plan Update for Hunter Park. ANC and the Lansing Parks and Recreation Department co-hosted meetings where participants created a list of ideas for improvements they wanted to see in Hunter Park, including a picnic shelter, a walking path with lights and benches, and a greenhouse for year-round gardening. In response to this interest, an MSU student intern at ANC helped organize neighbors to create a new organization. The Friends of Hunter Park was officially formed on November 17, 2004. Since that time, FHP members have participated in cleaning the park, hosting the first annual Hunter Park Music Fest, and meeting every month to plan activities to bring our neighbors together and keep the park safe and fun for all. The Friends of Hunter Park will have a volunteer meeting on **August 9th** to prepare for the Music Fest (see above); all are welcome to lend their time and talents to this celebration of our park!



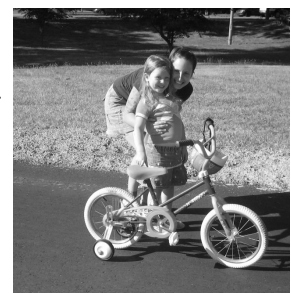
### *Hunter Park Today*

If you have recently traveled Kalamazoo St. by Hunter Park, you may have noticed that the chainlink fence has been taken down. A ½ mile recreational path has been installed along the perimeter of the park. This, along with the Garden House (coming soon), are courtesy of a Cool Cities grant obtained through a cooperative effort between ANC, Lansing Parks and Rec, and Friends of Hunter Park.



### *What Does the Future Hold?*

ANC and FHP are busy planning for the future of these park improvements. The walking path will be the focus of the People's Park Hour, a twice-a-week session that will include numerous walking clubs, sports, activities for kids, and family fun, every Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 to 10:30 AM. The Garden House will be used by young gardeners to sow and hone their interest in the natural world. It will also be a site for a great variety of gardening-related workshops. ## Work of Christ Community

The Work of Christ is a Christian community that includes 23 families living on the Eastside. We talked to Janice Munk, a long-time member.

**EN:** Why the Eastside?

**JM:** We chose to come because other families from the Work of Christ had moved here – housing was very inexpensive. My husband and I thought of this as a five-year house, but it's been over 20 years because it's turned out to be a wonderful place to live. We didn't know that coming in.

**EN:** What is the Work of Christ community?

**JM:** It's an ecumenical Christian group made up of people from many different churches: Catholic, Orthodox, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Free Church, and others. We grew out of a charismatic prayer meeting in the late 60's and early 70's that met at the Catholic student center. We talked about staying together in community, and decided to make a covenant commitment to each other and to God. We're trying to be disciples of Christ and live a Christian life in a consistent and supported way.

**EN:** What's your approach to neighborhood development?

**JM:** We don't have an official approach, but many of our members are active in their neighborhoods. Personally, I can say that knowing your neighbors makes an enormous difference in your quality of life. We get to know more people in the neighborhood because of our relationships with one another. Relationships build relationships!

### Educational Options

There are many programs provided by the Lansing School District for your child, whether they're preschool rookies or high school veterans.

#### Free Preschool Programs

The **Head Start Program** is a preschool program for children aged three to five in low-income families. Students can participate in a number of educational activities, receive free medical and dental care, eat healthy meals, and play in safe, constructive environments. For more information, contact the Capital Area Community Services Head Start office at 482-1504.

The **Montessori Classroom** allows your child to choose their own activities and learn at their own pace through the use of all five senses. Classes are offered Monday through Thursday mornings or afternoons in 2 hour and 45 minutes increments. The Montessori Classroom is located at Wexford Elementary.

The **Chinese Immersion Classroom** allows students to be fully engrossed in two cultures, English and Chinese. Classes are full day, Monday through Thursday, throughout the school year at Post Oak Elementary. For half the day, students are in a Western classroom, speaking English and learning through problem solving. For the other half, students are in an Eastern classroom where Chinese language, culture and customs are taught. This new program will continue to grow as its students enter elementary school.

The **Traditional Classroom** offers lesson plans intended to teach basic social and academic skills needed at higher levels of education. Children learn social/emotional, intellectual, language, and literary skills through play. The full day traditional classroom is offered at the Harley Franks Early

Childhood Center, Cumberland Elementary, and Grand River Elementary. Half-day programs are offered through Harley Franks Childhood Center, Lewton School, and the Sheridan Road School.

For the Montessori, Immersion, or Traditional Classroom programs, your child must be four years old before December 1, 2006, a resident of the Lansing School District, and must meet two of the eligibility criteria. #### High School Programs

Eastern High School continues its tradition of academic excellence by starting the **International Baccalaureate Program** this school year. This rigorous college prep program provides students with the academic skill to succeed in college and compete in the global marketplace. Only four other schools in the state hold this distinction!

Free **vocational programs** offered at the Hill Center for Advanced Technology are designed for high school age students. They give students real-life experience in various trades and occupations. Fourteen programs are available, including automotive, construction, health careers, communications, and many others.

The **CRAFT Program** offered at Eastern High School varies from these vocational education classes. The CRAFT (Career Readiness and Fitness Training Program) program assists students in preparing for their first job through resume design, developing interview skills, and teaching employability skills such as punctuality, good attendance, work ethics, responsibility, and good working skills. Eventually, it will run right by the Greenhouse, slated for construction very soon.

In celebration of the spectacular new path and the increased activity it brings to the park, the Allen Neighborhood Center is offering the **People's Park Hour**, twice per week. Starting August 1st, a staff member will be in the park on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:30 AM - 10:30 AM. 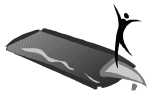

## Healing Foods Highlight: Herbs

For thousands of years, people have used herbs to flavor food, make tea, and treat diseases. It turns out they knew what they were doing. In 2002, researchers from the US Department of Agriculture found that herbs have high levels of antioxidants, making them cancer-fighting foods.

Among the herbs with the most kung-fu anti-cancer power, oregano ranked highest, with dill, thyme, rosemary, and peppermint following close behind.

So slide some peppermint into your smoothie, toss some thyme into your salad, or add extra oregano into your spaghetti sauce. Your body will thank you for it.
