The 2005 Eastside Home and Community Tour is just ahead! On June 25th from 1 to 5 PM, join us for a tour of beautiful Eastside homes, gardens, and other institutions. Just a few of this year's highlights include:

A Place So Foreign: The Refugee Experience in Lansing



Lansing's Eastside is the destination for a surprising number of refugees arriving from other countries: a current population of over 10,000, with about 600 more arriving each year. They come from Afghanistan, Cuba, Sudan, Sierra Leone, Bosnia, Somalia, and many other countries. The Refugee Development Center at Christ Lutheran Church, and Refugee Services, a division of Catholic Social Services, are the two main agencies that assist newcomers in building a successful life here.

THE REFUGEE EXPERIENCE *

"Have you ever taken a trip to another country, one with a very different culture from your own? Then you understand culture shock.

Imagine experiencing this culture shock as a refugee, sometimes fleeing for your life, sometimes leaving family behind in danger, always arriving unprepared for life in your new country.

Refugees may have been persecuted because of their religion. They may have lived in a refugee camp for years, and may have grown up in the camps. They may wake up in the night remembering bombings, killings, torture, starvation.

Refugees come to the United States with nothing but the clothes on their

backs. (Can you imagine arriving in Michigan in December in shirtsleeves?) They arrive and must care for their families with no beds, no chairs, no pots and pans, no friends, no money.

If refugees come from a village environment in some areas of the world, they may never have sat in a car or shopped in a grocery store. Even if they come from an urban environment or have a college degree, they may not speak English well enough to get a job in the United States.

Regardless of where they come from, refugees are suddenly thrust into a new environment and must survive on their own.

Refugee Services and the Refugee Development Center provide the orientation, education, and support refugees need to become self-sufficient members of American society."

HOW YOU CAN HELP

You can support refugees in Lansing by giving your time and your money.

Refugee Services asks that volunteers be at least 18 years old and have reliable transportation. No previous experience needed. Contact Farhad Silevany, farhadsilevany@css-svh.org or by calling 484-1010, extension 163.

REFUGEE SERVICES

Refugee Services has three main programs: Reception / Placement / Health (RPH), Employment, and Immigration. RPH assists in arranging housing, healthcare and community orientation. The Employment Program offers support for job development, placement and retention to newly arrived refugees as well as those seeking upgrades. Immigration Legal Services has a staff attorney who specializes in immigration issues, with services available to all Michigan residents proceedings, and community presentations on immigration issues.

REFUGEE DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The Refugee Center provides orientation and education free of charge to refugees in mid-Michigan. How can refugees find and keep jobs? What does a new refugee need to know to function in American society?

The Center provides refugees with an opportunity to learn to drive a car, including a state-of-the-art driving simulator, and provides the mid-Michigan community with cultural awareness education and events highlighting the cultures of different refugee groups.

Enjoy Summer Safely

School is almost out and Summer is around the corner. Here are a few tips to help keep your child safe while enjoying the sunshine.

IN THE SUN...

- Wear lightweight clothing with long sleeves
- Use a sunscreen that is at least SPF 15
- Keep hydrated by drinking plenty of cool water



AT THE POOL...

- Never leave children alone in or near the pool
- Keep rescue equipment and a portable telephone near the pool
- Whenever infants or toddlers are in or around water, an adult should be within arm's length, providing "touch supervision"

ON A BIKE...

- Make sure your child's bike is the right size. Oversized bikes are especially dangerous
- Instruct you child to wear a helmet at ALL TIMES
- Make sure your child's helmet meets CPSC safety standards
- Helmets need to be worn level on the head, not tipped forward or back. When the straps are fastened, the helmet should not move.

AROUND DOGS...



- Do not approach an unfamiliar dog
- Do not run from a dog and scream
- Remain motionless (e.g., "be still like a tree") when approached by an unfamiliar dog
- If knocked over by a dog, roll into a ball and lie still (e.g., "be still like a log")
- Do not play with a dog unless supervised by an adult


