Garden In A Box: A New Community Action Project for the YSC

The Youth Service Corps is piloting a new program to increase access to fresh food for people on the Eastside. The program is called "Garden in a Box" and is funded by the City of Lansing Human Relations and Community Services.

We are particularly interested in identifying and working with neighbors on a limited income who could use free fresh vegetables to supplement their food budgets; seniors with mobility concerns; and families with children. No knowledge of gar-

dening is needed to sign up for this program!

Our "Gardens in a Box" will be two feet wide, two feet long, and one foot deep. This will be big enough for two to four large vegetable plants, like tomatoes or peppers. We will be starting out placing twenty-four of these at neighbors' houses across the area. The boxes will be free to those of limited income. The YSC look at your yard and find the best location, deliver and assemble the box, and fill it with soil and plants. We will then visit your garden twice a month to answer questions and talk to you about your harvests. We are curious about what sort of impact this might have with neighbors and their encounters with fresh vegetables.

reach Worker with the OEC is a rewarding opportunity to give back to the Eastside. You meet countless new people and make great friends.

The OEC canvasses the neighborhood on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5:00-8:00, and on Fridays from 1:00-4:00. This continues through October. We also need outreach workers to assist with staffing our downstairs office beginning in late June and continuing throughout the year.

OEC volunteers can choose to canvass, staff our office, or do both. Canvassers need to be able to stand and walk for up to three hours at a time, but office volunteers just need to be able to sit and answer the phone and talk to people as they come in.

No previous experience is required—all you need is a friendly face and a willingness to learn! Training will be provided, and a lot of learning takes place on-the-job. Long-time Eastsiders, Lansing residents, East Lansing residents, and students are all welcome. For students, internship credit can be arranged through your school.

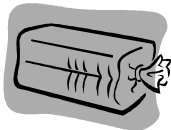

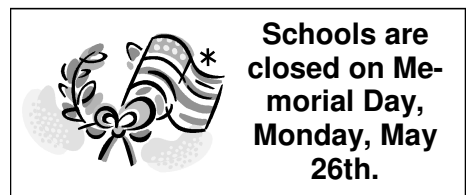
School News

Support Global Youth Locally

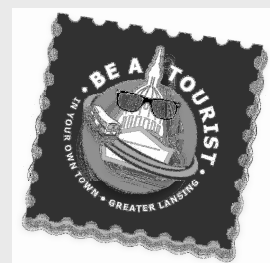
Immigration is an increasingly hot topic in American politics. According to the Census Bureau, there are 37.9 million immigrants living in the United States (both documented and undocumented) in 2007.

Lutheran Social Services of Michigan is a non-profit organization dedicated to supporting immigrant and refugee youth as they make a transition from their home country to America. Whether children have arrived in this country with legal documentation or apprehended by border security and placed in federal custody, LSSM provides a safe, nurturing and stable environment for youths who do not have parents or adults in this country who can offer proper care. Most importantly, the agency provides a home to children who would otherwise remain in a juvenile detention shelter or refugee camp where the opportunity for success is extremely limited. With your help, Lutheran Social Services can offer its services to more youth in need!

We are in desperate need of new foster care homes, especially who are willing to care for Spanish-speaking minors who are in the process of obtaining legal documentation or asylum in the U.S. These youth come to the United States for many reasons: reuniting with family, pursuing education or employment, escaping family violence or abuse, fleeing political or religious persecution, and seeking protection from gang violence or recruitment. Some children are brought here by adults seeking to exploit them

for commercial sex work, domestic servitude or other forced labor. Whatever the reason may be, the young people in this program have endured traumatic events in their home countries and need our support while they adjust to a new life in America. Every teenager, regardless of their nationality, deserves a great deal of patience, understanding and love. Help us give global youth the chance to succeed in the United States!

Now Is a Great Time To Buy a House:

Home Purchase Rehabilitation Loans from
GLHC can help you!

If you have been thinking about purchasing your first home, now is a great time. Interest rates on home loans are low and home prices are at record lows. Lots of people are scared about buying a home because of the decline in home values and the rise in foreclosures. But, you can purchase fantastic homes for very low prices now. Some foreclosed homes are especially good buys. If you see a home as a long term investment, and shop around for a good mortgage with a low, fixed interest rate, buying a home today is a wise investment.

If you are not sure where to start, **contact Jason Weller or Sean Chapman at ANC.** We offer free home buyer education classes that will walk you through the process of purchasing a home, as well as connect you with various programs that can help you along your way.

If you have your eyes on a home that is a “fixer-upper” the **Greater Lansing Housing Coalition (GLHC) Home Purchase Rehabilitation (HPR)** program could be a great fit. The program provides a no interest loan, up to about \$30,000 that can be used towards a down payment and doing repairs up front so that the work is completed before you move into the house. If managing the rehabilitation work is daunting to you, don't worry GLHC staff will manage the work in consultation with you.

Here is how the HPR program works:

- The Homebuyer goes to a bank or mortgage lender to get pre-qualified for a mortgage
- The Homebuyer picks a house,

makes a purchase offer and completes applications at GLHC for the HPR program and at a bank for a mortgage to purchase the property.

- The buyer completes Home Ownership Counseling



- If the home and buyer meet program guidelines, GLHC staff will write specifications

for the work and manage construction bidding for the buyer.

- When the mortgage and HPR loans are signed, construction begins. GLHC staff will manage the bidding, construction, and approvals with the buyer and City inspectors.
- The Homebuyer moves into a work-completed home that meets city building codes.

If you are still unsure of what the HPR program could for you, here is the story of one family who is using the program to purchase a HUD repossessed home. The buyers found a foreclosed home that was listed for \$50,000 on the South side of Lansing. The home has three bedrooms, two full baths, one half-bath, living room, dining room, kitchen, and a library room. The HPR program will contribute approximately \$30,000 to be split between repairing the home and the down payment. And the HPR loan won't be repaid until the home is sold or transferred, the mortgage is refinanced for any reason other than better terms, or 50 years has passed.

Seasonal Air Pollution

As we begin a new season, we look forward to an increase in sunshine and warmer temperatures. This means we will once gain be approaching Ozone Season, where air pollution is the worst it gets during the whole year. This year, our community will be facing stricter air quality standards, and we could experience more unhealthy ozone days.

Peak Ozone Season occurs during the warm summer months, May through September. During these months, CATA's Clean Commute Options program and local media stations will be making Ozone Action Announcements. The announcements will be made when we face a code “Orange” day, which means that ground-level ozone concentrations have reached levels that are unhealthy for community members to breathe. Those most affected are sensitive groups, including people with asthma or other breathing problems, children, the elderly, and those who are active outdoors all day.

During Ozone Action Season, there are simple steps that we can all take to help reduce emissions and improve the air that we breathe. Steps to take include:

- Instead of driving alone, try taking the bus, carpooling, riding your bike or walking
- Fuel up your vehicle at the end of the day
- Don't top off your tank
- Limit idling your vehicle
- Trip Chain - Combine your errands to reduce vehicle trips
- Don't mow your lawn on Ozone Action Days


