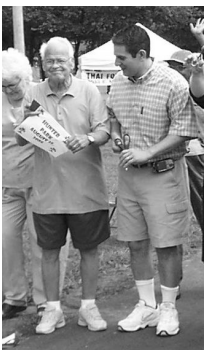

### Coming Soon to Foster Park

As part of a floodplain education project, volunteer help is needed to refurbish, paint and install a flood pole in Foster Park. The pole will have marks showing how high floodwaters were in Foster Park during four Eastside floods. Plaques around the pole will have other historic flood information.

This spring, a rain garden will be installed around the flood pole. A rain garden contains native plants and flowers that are designed to improve water quality by absorbing and filtering rainwater. Where can you go on the Eastside to find dinosaur bones, comic books, Nintendo cartridges, chainmail armor, board games, stained glass, gargoyles, an original sword used in the movie *Braveheart*, and a Four-Square Full Gospel Baptist minister? **Try Capital City Collectibles, located at 2016 East Michigan Avenue.**

Stephan Jahner, formerly of Capital City Comics, opened the store two and a half years ago along with Tom Hoadley and Rudy Martinez. While they are indeed a comic book store (with a great selection), they stock marvelous collectibles of all kinds, from Beanie Babies and model kits to swords, dolls, gold and platinum albums, and animation cels. The minister, however, is not for sale—he is an employee, David Jenkins.

Most people don't know that the store has a special Comic Book Club. For \$10 per year, members receive a 10-20% discount on new comics, a 10-30% discount on collectible comics, and 10% off everything else. They also receive \$5 in free merchandise on their birthday. As of August 7, the club had 185 active members. Also, any well-behaved child who comes in (this includes "children" of all ages) can select a free comic book from a special section of the store.

Stephen, a local musician and artist as well as vendor of comics and collectibles, takes pride in having helped many children who were reluctant to read. At first, he lets them read typical superhero comics, but slowly and surely advances them through Classics Illustrated comics (which are classic novels in comic-book form) and then onto more challenging illustrated non-fiction works that he keeps in stock.

- working with ANC's Economic Development Coordinator to promote improvements on neighborhood commercial corridors
- linking residents to a wide range of housing resources, e.g., grant and loan programs for renovations, home improvement and maintenance classes, landlord-tenant concerns, foreclosure prevention, and more.

This position is full-time, and pays approximately \$18,000.00/year, plus benefits. At the end of their year of service, AmeriCorps volunteers also receive a \$4725 educational stipend, which can be applied toward education or a student loan.

## Fenner Nature Center

Near the corner of Mount Hope and Aurelius is one of the Eastside's wildest places. With 130 acres of land and four miles of hiking trails, it includes forest, field, pond and garden. Thanks to the vision of city forester Carl Fenner, this parcel of former farmland has been preserved since 1959 as a site for education and recreation.

The park is open year round from 8 AM until dusk; the visitor center is open 10 AM to 4 PM Tuesday through Friday, and

1 PM to 5 PM Saturday and Sunday (through October). One of the highlights of the nature center is its paved trails – over ½ mile for easy walking or wheelchair use. (However, no dogs, bikes, or alcohol are allowed in the park.)

Fenner will offer fall classes for all ages, including toddlers and preschool, starting on October 2nd. Classes will be announced in the Lansing Parks & Recreation Fall 2006 / Winter 2007 Program Guide, available starting Sept. 1st at Foster Community Center. Registration begins on Sept. 11th for Lansing residents and Sept. 18th for non-residents. Watch for more information next month on Fenner's Apple Butter Festival and fall fundraiser, coming in October!

# Community Builder's Toolbox

## Ideas and Information for Strengthening Neighborhoods

### Be a Good Steward: Recycle!

The Lansing area offers opportunities to recycle various kinds of items.

- Lansing has a curbside recycling program that accepts **clear and brown glass, flattened metal, HDPE #2 or PET #1 plastics, newspapers, and mixed paper and junk mail**. If you need a recycling bin, or to find out your neighborhood's pickup date, please call 483-4400 or email [Recycle@ci.lansing.mi.us](mailto:Recycle@ci.lansing.mi.us).

- The city also has a drop-off recycling program located at 530 E. South Street at the corner of South and Beech Streets. (Follow S. Washington Ave. to South St., which is located just north of the railroad tracks.) This site accepts **corrugated cardboard, telephone books, athletic shoes, magazines, mixed paper, and junk mail**, and is open 24-7.

- Household batteries and cellular phones** can be dropped off at the Waste Reduction Services office between 8:00 am and 4:00 pm, Monday through Friday. This office is located at 601 E. South Street, on the second floor.

- Ingham County residents can drop off hazardous household waste at the Ingham County Human Services Facility, at 5303 S. Cedar, every Thursday from 2:00 to 6:00 pm. They accept **pesticides, household batteries and cell phones, cleaners and polishes, flammables, wood preservatives, asphalt sealer and roofing tar, fuel oil, brake fluid, steering fluid, transmission fluid, photographic chemicals, fluorescent lights, aerosol containers, home repair prod-**

**ucts, mercury containing products, small propane tanks, acids and bases, and oil paint and paint products.** They DO NOT accept waste oil or antifreeze, latex paint, business wasted, explosives, radioactive material, helium tanks, automotive batteries, 20 lb. propane tanks, empty containers, or anything in 55-gallon drums.



### Do 1 Thing...Communication [www.do1thing.us](http://www.do1thing.us)

*The mission of Do 1 Thing is to move individuals, families, organizations, businesses, and communities to prepare for all hazards and become disaster resilient.*

**THE GOAL:** Have the ability to locate and communicate with family members during a disaster (such as a flood).

#### Disaster Communication

Cell phones are very unreliable during disasters. The networks quickly become overloaded and the towers and infrastructure can also be affected by the event. Remember that if your home loses power, cordless phones and internet (Voice Over IP) phones will not work. The most reliable option is to keep a phone with a cord on hand.

#### Outside the Area Contact

Sometimes during disasters, local phone circuits get overloaded. Choose a friend or relative outside of the local calling area to be your "outside the area" contact. Make sure family members carry their number with them.

#### Family Assistance

In a large event, a Family Assistance Center will be opened to help reunite families separated by disaster. The Red Cross can also help with family reunification. They will make contact with emergency responders and other agencies on your behalf.

#### In Case of Emergency (ICE)

If you are injured and not able to give information, police and hospital personnel may have a difficult time contacting your family. If you have a cell phone you can provide that information to emergency personnel:

- Create a new contact in your cell phone's phone book
- Name the contact ICE.
- Enter the phone numbers for the person you would like to have notified in the event of a medical emergency.

#### Evacuation Plan

Designate a reunion site outside of your neighborhood where all family members can meet. Your reunion site should be a place that is not in your immediate neighborhood, but is well known by the family, like a park, restaurant, or shopping center.

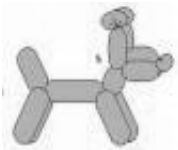

## Free Lead Testing at the Allen Neighborhood Center

Older Eastside houses can put our children at higher risk for lead poisoning because of lead paint on the walls and old paint chips in the soil. Now is the time to do something about it. In partnership with the Ingham County Health Department, Physicians Health Plan of Mid-Michigan, and McLaren Health Plan, we are offering free lead testing at the Allen Neighborhood Center.

Bring your children ages 1-6 to ANC on Wednesday September 13, 2006. Testing will be held during the Farmer's Market, from 2:30-6:30 pm in our upstairs offices. Each child tested will receive a gift bag with goodies like stickers, a flashlight and a coloring book along with a \$5 gift certificate to spend at the Farmer's Market.



The testing will be done in a cheerful, friendly environment. Face-painting and balloon animals will keep kids occupied, and we'll have a video showing in the waiting area. Healthy snacks will be provided.

There is no need for a trip to the doctor's office or health department, and you will not have to wait for results. Testing will be done by staff from the Ingham County Health Department (ICHHD) and results will be available immediately. If your child's test indicates a high level of lead, the ICHHD staff will talk to you about the services they can offer.



We will need the signature of a parent or guardian to perform the test. **Relatives or caregivers can bring children for testing if they have written permission from the parent or guardian.**

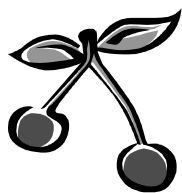
